December 2024 Hanukkah – The Struggle Between Judaism and Hellenism

Americans love to celebrate Hanukkah more than any other holiday other than possibly Passover. Hanukkah is a Jewish festival commemorating the recovery of Jerusalem and subsequent rededication of the Second Temple at the beginning of the Maccabean Revolt against the Seleucid Empire.

We know about the miracle of the purified sanctified Galilean olive oil that was only enough for one day but burned for 8 days. We love to celebrate Hanukkah but what does it really mean?

We all know that there was a war between the Syrian Greeks and the Jews which we celebrate today in a holiday called Hanukkah, the festival of lights. We won the war and were able to re-purify the temple. But what led up to this war?

The answer is our insistence on monotheism. Today it seems obvious that for those who believe in God, there is one God. But that wasn't so obvious 2,200 years ago!

What pushed many Jews into rebelling against the Syrian Greeks was the King's insistence on offering sacrifices to the Greek gods in the holy Temple in Jerusalem. This was crossing a red line that could not be tolerated.

Most Jews wanted to bring the best of Greek culture into our Jewish religion and culture. We wanted to incorporate the best of our religion Judaism as well as the best of secular knowledge. Much of our Western civilization comes from the Greeks including the thinkers Socrates, Plato and Aristotle. We Jews want to incorporate truth into our understanding of the world no matter where we might find truth.

Hellenistic Judaism was a form of Judaism in classical antiquity that combined Jewish religious tradition with elements of Greek culture. Hellenism brought with it the promise of intellectual enlightenment. Many Jews embraced Hellenistic culture and combined it with their Jewish religion.

So in theory it should be possible to combine Hellenism with Judaism in order to make something that is profound and meaningful. Someone wanted to incorporate just a little bit of Hellenism into their Judaism and someone to incorporate a medium amount of Hellenism and someone wanted to incorporate a great deal of Hellenism. Just like today, different Jews have different approaches to how to integrate wisdom from non-jewish sources into Judaism.

Continued Message From Rabbi Kaplan

If we take in too much from the secular culture around us, we risk losing our Jewish identity. That's why we base Judaism on the performance of the mitzvot. This allows us to do distinctly Jewish acts of religiosity on a daily basis.

Judaism is based on The Torah which included the stories and laws that shaped Jewish life. Practices like circumcision, eating kosher food, and observing the Sabbath helped Jews maintain a distinctive identity under Hellenistic rule.

There was a universalistic element to Hellenism that encouraged people to see themselves as citizens of the world and not just as members of their tribe. Many of us see this as a good thing, at least in moderation. We want to be citizens of the world as well as members of the Jewish community.

But not all Jews were so accommodating to Hellenism. Many felt that it was a threat to purely monotheistic conception of the Jewish religion and indeed to the continued existence of the Jewish people. The conflict between those who embraced Hellenism and those who rejected Hellenism broke out in the second century BCE in what we now know as the Maccabean wars.

The Syrian Greek king Antiochus intervened in an internal civil war between the Maccabean Jews and the Hellenized Jews in Jerusalem over who would be the High Priest. As the conflict escalated, Antiochus took the side of the Hellenizers by prohibiting the religious practices the traditionalists had rallied around.

Hellenistic Judaism led to the development of both rabbinic Judaism and early Christianity. Jews and Christians interpreted scripture differently, in large part based upon their degree of reliance on Greek translations. The Torah, of course, was written (mostly) in Hebrew. To keep it accessible to Jews who no longer spoke Hebrew, it was translated into Greek by a group of 70 (or perhaps 72) scholars. Therefore, this translation of the Hebrew Bible was called the Septuagint, a word based on the Greek word for seventy.

If the Greek king had not pushed radical Hellenism on us we would have been happy to work with him to integrate Greek culture into our lives. But once he insisted upon forcing us to offer sacrifices to the Greek gods in the Jewish temple, it was a threat to our religious beliefs and to our core Jewish identity. The only possible response was rebellion.

On the 8 days of Hanukkah, we celebrate our commitment to monotheism and to the continued vitality of Judaism in a world that can sometimes be hostile to us. It is both a religious holiday and a national holiday and that it celebrates both our commitments to Judaism as a religion and jewishness as an ethnicity. We fought for both of these parts of our identities and we were victorious.

And so I want to wish everyone a very Happy Hanukkah!



NOTES FROM OUR CANTOR

"Don't let the light go out — it's lasted for so many years!"

Who among us supposes this lyric to Peter Yarrow's song refers to an old incandescent bulb? Okay, we all know what 'light' really is, don't we? Before revisiting that wonderful song this month, let us reexamine what we truly encompass when it is sung.

Historian Yosef ben Mattityahu (better known as Flavius Josephus), c. AD 37 - c. 100) chronicled the Maccabean revolt through the Hasmonean dynasty. In his book <u>Jewish Antiquities XII</u>, Judas Maccabeus proclaimed there would be eight days of festivities annually after the rededication of the Temple in Jerusalem. It had been profanely decimated by Antiochus IV Epiphanes. Josephus does not say the festival was called 'Hanukkah' (Dedication) but rather the "Festival of Lights." He wrote: "They had regained the freedom of their worship; they made it a law for their posterity... And from that time to this we celebrate this festival and call it 'Lights.' I suppose the reason was because this liberty, beyond our hopes, appeared to us." The celebration included feasts, splendid sacrifices, hymns, and psalms.

The story of Hanukkah is also alluded to in the book of 1 Maccabees and 2 Maccabees. The Book of Judith, not in the Tanach, records that an Assyrian General, Holofernes, had surrounded the village of Bethulia as part of his campaign to conquer Judea. After intense fighting, the water supply of the Jews was cut off and the situation became desperate. Judith (Yehudit), a pious widow, told the city leaders that she had a plan to save the city. She went into the Assyrian camps and pretended to surrender. She met Holofernes, who was quite taken by her beauty. She went back with him to his tent where she plied him with wine and cheese. When he fell into a satiated, drunken sleep, she severed his head and escaped the camp with it. He had cut off the Jews' water, so she cut off his...well, anyway, this chapter is the reason why we not only eat fried foods at Hanukkah, remembering the midrash of the oil that lasted for eight nights, but we also eat dairy foods to remember the story of Judith and her culinary skills. More things to sing about. Loudly!

The thoughts I've shared are overlapping convictions, reasons to take so seriously the lighting of the candles when we sing (translated): "We light these lights for the miracles and the wonders, for the redemption and battles that You waged for our forefathers and foremothers, in those days at this season."

When we sing our prayers and songs, we reconnect with our long history, rekindling our passion for the *first* light. And as Genesis states, before there was light, there was sound: "God *said:* "Let there be light!" May this holiday, so closely aligned on the calendar this year with the dates of other folks' celebrations, keep the light shining brightly in peace for all God's children.

AN IMPORTANT MESSAGE FROM THE TEMPLE

Wearing a Tallit for Honors at Temple Beth Shalom of the West Valley

Members of Temple Beth Shalom – or any other Reform Jewish congregation – are not required to wear a tallit or kippah at any time during religious services, although many of our members do so – especially during the High Holy days. Neither the Union for Reform Judaism (URJ) nor the Central Conference of American Rabbis (CCAR) require persons who hold or carry a Torah, or who recite the blessing before or after the reading of the Torah or the Haftorah, to wear a tallit.

Dress Code

At the Board meeting of November 17, the Board unanimously passed a dress code for those sitting on the Bimah and carrying the Torah. Honorees should be wearing synagogue appropriate clothing. No shorts will be allowed. Thank you for your cooperation.

When Carrying or Holding a Torah or Reciting a Blessing

TBS provides a tallit rack with tallitot in the lobby just before the entry doors to the sanctuary. These tallitot are available to anyone to borrow for wearing during a service. We just ask that if you borrow one, you fold it and return it to the rack after the service. There is usually a "spare" tallit or two folded up and sitting on the top of a bookshelf along the wall leading to the sanctuary. Any of these can also be borrowed for wearing during a service.

Please let the Rabbi know if you would like to discuss anything related to this matter of wearing a tallit at TBS.



Americans love to celebrate Hanukkah more than any other holiday other than possibly Passover. But what led up to this war and why was it so important for the history of Judaism and Christianity?

Hellenistic Judaism was a form of Judaism in classical antiquity that combined Jewish religious tradition with elements of Greek culture. Most Jews embraced Hellenistic culture and combined it with their Jewish religion. But many felt that it was a threat to the continued existence of the Jewish people. The conflict between those who embraced Hellenism and those who rejected Hellenism broke out in the second century BCE in what we now know as the Maccabean war.

This 3-part/4-hour course will be led by Rabbi Dana Evan Kaplan, spiritual leader of Temple Beth Shalom of the West Valley. The course will enable Jews and Christians to look at the Maccabean war and analyze what were the values of the opposing sides as well as what were the consequences of the Maccabean victory.

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
