#### Hanukkah: The Festival of Lights

Hanukkah is the festival of lights. Light equates with goodness. Light serves as a symbol of life, happiness, prosperity, and, in a wider sense, of perfect being. As a symbol of life, light can also serve as a symbol of immortality.

Light symbolizes enlightenment, understanding of what makes the world go round. We seek light during times of darkness, meaning that we seek to understand how to make the world a better place at a time when things look like human beings are determined to kill each other and wreck the natural environment.

The holiday of Hanukkah, also called the Festival of Lights, actually commemorates not one but two celebrations: the stunning military victory of the Jews led by the Hasmoneans over the Syrian Greeks in 164 BCE, and also the miracle of the menorah that was lit upon the Jewish restoration of the Temple, where the light that had enough oil to last one day lasted for eight days.

After a successful revolt against a tyrannical monarch, the victorious Jews could find almost no pure olive oil to light the Menorah. However, the oil lasted long enough to purify more oil and bring it to the Jerusalem Temple.

The military victory over the Greeks appears to be the earlier justification for the holiday. During talmudic times, the sages appear to have introduced the idea of the miracle of the single cruse of oil that lasted for 8 days. It was very important to keep the light lit in the temple at all times and this miracle allowed that to happen until more oil could be brought from the Galilee.

We celebrate the perseverance of the flames of the Hanukkah menorah, remembering the Jerusalem Temple which connects us to an earlier form of Judaism. The temple in Jerusalem was where all of the Jewish holidays were celebrated and all of the prayers to God were offered. Many of these prayers were delivered to God in the form of sacrifices. I don't want to see animal sacrifices restored in the Jerusalem Temple under any circumstances but I think the light of the fire can be used as a very powerful metaphor.

### **CONTINUED MESSAGE FROM RABBI KAPLAN**

God created light before anything else. The book of Genesis records in Genesis 1:3 that on the first day of creation: "God said, 'Let there be light,' and there was light." God was taking the leap of faith in creating the world. There was a tremendous sense of hope and optimism that was symbolized by the creation of light at the very beginning of the process.

Light can bring us hope. Knowing that letting the light of faith shine can bring about real change for the betterment in our lives. Hope comes into its own when crisis looms, opening us to new creative possibilities.

Light can bring us wisdom. The word "enlighten" means to give knowledge to other people. Light stands for truth. Light gives us the wisdom to choose life over death, to choose good over evil. Transcendent wisdom lies in the heart of every religion, where it is often acquired through intuitive knowing, going beyond mere practical wisdom and includes self-knowledge, interconnectedness, conditioned origination of mind-states and other deeper understandings of subjective experience.

Today, we can look at Hanukkah as a holiday of Light. Light is a symbol of life that comes from a loving creator who cares about the creation of the world and the creation of living beings including humans. Just as all living things on Earth need sunlight to grow physically, people need the light of loving relationships with God as well as other human beings and other types of life to fully experience the beauty of the world in all of its manifestations.



## NOTES FROM OUR CANTOR

#### "When times are dark with much despair, we need the spark of those who'll dare. Then comes a band of us who'll fight to save the land and bring the Light!"

Those opening lines of my song, "Be a Maccabi", resonate with me even more this year, reminding me of what could be the most dreaded disease of all: apathy, abetted by disunity and misplaced values. Would it require a choir of angels to sing my song again? My personal belief is that the songs we sing on an annual cycle can renew our faith in God and in ourselves, firing up our core values into positive action fulfillment.

During Hanukkah, we review its history, as in "*Mi Y'Maleil*" Who can retell the things that befell us? In the medieval poem, "*Maoz Tzur*", the middle four stanzas list events of our persecution and praise God for our peoples' survival despite these tragedies: Slavery and subsequent exodus from Egypt; the Babylonian captivity, wicked Haman's plot of genocide; and of this holiday, the Hasmonean victory that halted total annihilation of our Jewish identity. The poetry and melodies of Hanukkah move us, even drive us to that same realization we reached at this time last year. Our freedom as a people is always fragile, always requiring protection and devotion.

Yes, it is through songs and prayers that we may reconnect to the living passion of their composers and authors. We may rekindle their inner fire by singing with gusto and reverence. To think that spinning a dreidel was more than a simple game which inspired a very childlike song. Learning that it had been a disguised aid for studying Torah, an act which was banned, picturing our ancestors in caves with a watchman outside to alert them if the authorities came and the proceedings would then appear to be more playful: This is serious, and yet, in our own lifetime, "I have a little Dreidel" is relegated to its position as just a cute children's song.

This holiday is much more than cooking foods in oil and sharing chocolate wrapped in gold foiled coins. Our identity was almost stripped before the rallying of our forces prevailed.

#### "We light these lights for the miracles and the wonders, for the redemption and The battles that You waged for our forefathers, in those days at this season."

Those words from, "*Hanerot Halalu (Al Hanisim*)" are not petty gilding to be tossed away. As much as the Chanukiahs' candles, these songs are guiding lights, still active entities, keeping us *in* the Light of Torah, to be ourselves, enlightened. This implies that we will we remain aware of the pitfalls of a chosen people. Yes there are dangers out there, but the greater threat may come from within. If we are destined to be forgotten, it could very well begin with our own disregard of who we are. All the tragedies, miracles, and wonders need only remind us. So, perhaps with more importance than meets the ear, again, on *this* Hanukkah, let us sing!

#### **MESSAGE FROM YOUR PRESIDENT**

#### A Congregation at a Crossroads: Where Did All the Members Go?

Temple Beth Shalom of the West Valley is a great congregation. I love being a member here, which is why I'm willing to donate my time as a volunteer. The history of our congregation is interesting, but I must admit that at first I couldn't believe it when I first learned that when Rabbi Arthur Abrams became our Rabbi in 1997, TBS had about 500 members. But, even then Russ Robbins told me the numbers had started to decline. Where did all the members go? What happened? This is not a "good news" message.

Much has changed in the west valley and across this country that has affected synagogue membership since TBS was founded. In the west valley, the number of "Shalom" clubs in the growing 55+ communities has been a



significant source of "competition". Many retired Jews decided when they left their home communities in the Midwest and the eastern United States that they were tired of paying synagogue dues. Their children were grown, they adopted a new lifestyle in retirement, and they had an opportunity to "be Jewish" and meet other Jews through the Shalom Clubs. They decided they no longer needed membership in a synagogue. Over the years, we have had new members every year, but others moved away, passed away, or decided they just didn't want to pay dues every year and didn't have a need to affiliate.

At the same time, all across the United States, Catholic and protestant churches, as well as other Reform and Conservative congregations have experienced the same sociological change: people no longer felt an urge to affiliate or belong to a church or a synagogue. Membership numbers have slowly been declining in churches and synagogues throughout the United States.

Then COVID hit. That was the "frosting on the cake". TBS, like other synagogues and most churches throughout the US, had to tell our members to STAY AWAY. With few exceptions, the COVID pandemic forced us to avoid personal contact with our members. We learned to communicate by telephone and ZOOM, and while we are thankful we had ZOOM, the pandemic had devastating consequences on synagogue and church membership. When we reached a point when most people could feel comfortable, or at least somewhat safe in returning, many just didn't: they discovered they didn't need synagogue membership or activities anymore.

In the three years between March 2020 (when TBS had to "shut down" due to COVID-19) and July 1, 2022, our membership decreased from approximately 195 members to 180 members. From July 1, 2021 thru October 31, 2022, approximately 50 new members have joined TBS. That means approximately 65 people who were members between March 2020 and October 31, 2022 have left. There are multiple reasons: some moved away – either to be closer to their children in other cities or they didn't like the weather in the valley anymore; many passed away; some didn't like the annual dues increase; Religious School families left the congregation as soon as their child became a Bar or Bat Mitzvah; for some, we just weren't the "right fit"; others just decided they didn't need a temple any more. Some of the new members left for various reasons.

Whatever the reason, the decreasing numbers of members has had a gradual detrimental effect on the income needed to operate the Temple. This past year, the Budget and Finance Committee learned that for over 20 years, almost every year the temple has had an income shortfall (a DEFICIT) because the congregation did not raise enough money through dues, fundraising, and other activities to meet the costs of operating the temple. The TBS Endowment was never intended to be a piggy bank for congregation income shortfalls. It was designed to provide a source of income to pay for **capital repairs and improvements**. Because of the annual operating income shortfall just about every year and the Board of Directors' dependence on the Endowment, the TBS Endowment has gone from having over \$400,000 in it to just over \$100,000.

During COVID, there was virtually no fundraising, dues income was reduced, and other income during the High Holy Days was negligible. In addition to turning to the Endowment for support, for nearly two years the Board of Directors had to authorize using the Temple's saving account to meet our financial obligations, which reduced our savings account from \$150,000 to nearly \$0.

In 2021-2022, we raised more money through fundraising than had been raised in some time, but it still wasn't enough. The Board had to request money from the Endowment again. We ended 2021-2022 with a \$90,000 deficit. For 2022-2023 (this year), the congregation approved a deficit budget of \$40,000. However, so many members dropped their membership this year, that the reduced income will add approximately an additional \$20,000 to the deficit. This has

created an enormous problem.

The Board of Directors has not been ignoring this problem. We are concentrating significant program efforts toward "outreach" – bringing in new members. We know there are thousands of Jews living in the West Valley who don't live in 55+ communities and aren't affiliated with any synagogue. Part of the problem is they don't know we are here! The Outreach Committee is working on that. We have also cut expenses in every way that doesn't interfere with effective operations.



#### **Continued Message from President Fay Henning-Bryant**

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We did not hire a choir director/pianist; we did not fill the position held by the former Religious School/ Program Director; we do not have any Religious School expenses (that was not planned and we are not happy about that) we did not hire the part-time position previously held by Helene Fox when she was promoted to Synagogue Administrator. Only recently we hired Charlotte Trujillo as a part-time Administrative Assistant to help in areas that weren't being addressed.

However, even with various fundraising events planned for the 2<sup>nd</sup> half of this year, we will still end the year with a significant deficit. There is no savings account. The Endowment is not a Temple piggy bank.

The Board of Directors has discussed this in great detail and considered various options. The conclusion reached by the Board is that the most feasible and realistic path for us to increase our income to an adequate level is to rent out parts of our building long-term basis. We have taken square footage measurements in all parts of the building and have identified areas with high potential to rent out. Every effort will be made to minimize interfering with our Temple functions. A small subcommittee headed up by Russ Robbins has been interviewing commercial brokers, with the plan that the Board will select one which we think will be interested in working with us to find a good tenant to whom we can lease space.

Although this is not the path that we ever thought we would be taking, I can assure you that through my contact with other URJ Temple Presidents, TBS is not the only Reform temple having to rent out space. Reform congregations across the country are doing so, and as you drive around the valley, you will see signs all over in front of churches that another church is renting space there. Our Presbyterian neighbor to the west of us is renting to a Baptist church. Congregation Beth Emeth in Sun City West is renting space for worship services to a Christian church.

This has not been a monthly message that I wanted to write. It is not a "good news" message. However, I have been committed to being transparent about the status of our congregation. Every member has a right to know about this and a responsibility to do whatever each of us can. I want to assure you that the Board of Directors is committed to keeping Temple Beth Shalom a place we can continue to call our temple home. As more information becomes available, we will keep you informed. Please feel free to contact me or any member of the Board of Directors about this situation.
