



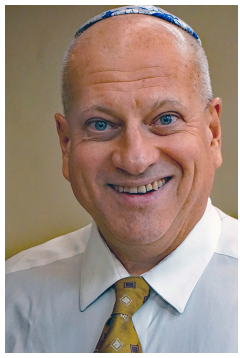

Preparing Our Heads and Hearts for the High Holy Days

As the days of Elul draw us closer to Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, we enter a sacred time of reflection, renewal, and return. The High Holy Days are not simply holidays marked on a calendar — they are opportunities to pause, to listen inwardly, and to realign our lives with our deepest values. The High Holy Days give us an opportunity to reconnect with Judaism.

Our Temple is devoted to helping people to do the thinking and feeling work that we need to do to make ourselves more thoughtful and more in touch with their emotions. While we may be located in Sun City, we reach out to the entire West Valley, an area with possibly as many as 20,000 people of Jewish origin, almost all of whom are unaffiliated. We do our best to meet the spiritual needs of people of all ages as well as all backgrounds.

Rosh Hashanah, the birthday of the world, invites us to begin again. It is a time to ask: Who have I been this past year? Whom have I hurt? Where have I grown? We offer courses based on positive psychology which are designed to help us to reach our full human potential.

We sound the shofar not only to wake ourselves from spiritual slumber, but to remind ourselves that change is possible — even now, even for us. While acquiring material objects has its place in life, Judaism teaches us that there is much more. Rosh Hashanah begins on Sept. 22.

Yom Kippur, the Day of Atonement, offers us the courage to face our mistakes with honesty and compassion. It is not about pointless guilt but about meaningful emotional growth. Teshuvah — returning to the person we are meant to be — is the work of the season. It requires humility, accountability, forgiveness and/or Letting Go, both from ourselves and from others.

Many of us have walked long paths in life, and yet the High Holy Days remind us that renewal is always within reach. No matter our age or stage, our souls are still unfolding. Let us approach these days with open hearts, with sincerity in prayer, and with a readiness to heal relationships — with family, with community, and with God.

May this season uplift us, inspire us, and guide us toward a sweeter, more compassionate new year.

Shanah Tovah U'Metukah — a good and sweet year to you all.





NOTES FROM CANTOR BARUCH KORITAN

Hoping to see you at our Selichot Service on Saturday evening, September 13th. One of my favorite events, yet not well-known to some folks, Selichot means 'forgiveness.' Gates of Forgiveness is a little, gray-covered paperback book containing wonderful poetry and inspirational readings. We voice them aloud, responsively with Rabbi Kaplan. He will also deliver a meaningful message to add even more depth and receptivity. The melodies I am privileged to sing lift me as they waft toward places I can only hope to know — and there is no instrumental accompaniment, offering us a unique opportunity to simply reflect on our relationship with our Creator. We are, however, presented choruses to sing with gusto during the Havdalah portion, which opens the short but memorable service. What follows is more introspective, which I find most appealing in its unabashed, picturesque reality. For me, the melodies' impact has a way of heading right for my *kishkehs* (Yiddish for 'intestines'). The chants are deeply moving, full of long-overdue yearning to repent, to find and give forgiveness. The liturgy introduces the High Holy Days' message: This is the time we begin our quest to make right everything that was regrettable on our part in the past year, that we be absolved, and find mercy for those who may have also done the same to us.

We sing in all four cardinal directions, offering forgiveness to our loved ones, to our 'not' friends (supposed enemies), to ourselves, and God. This entire procedure is humbling yet gratifying, a lot like how wonderful breaking the fast after Yom Kippur is; so is dealing with our transgressions, large or small, and then being blessed to begin again with a refreshed spirit.

For the first time this season, we hear, "*Sh'ma Koleinu*" (Hear our voice). Musically, it's a virtual feast for me to sing and also an emotional experience for the dedicated listeners as well. Its translation begs: "Have compassion upon us and accept our prayer. Do not forget us when we are old, as our strength diminishes; do not abandon us." --- Wow! I get to sing this...I get to **live** this. And several weeks later, again, on Yom Kippur Day, we hear this time soaked, unforgettable melody by Max Helfman, dedicated (above the title) to the operatic and cantorial tenor, Jan Peerce.

Cantor Koritan's message continued

Our fragility, dependent on God's mercy, is gripping. As your *Shaliach Tzibbur* (singing spokesman messenger of the community), I must convey the risky emotions which the liturgy, along with the melody, opens to us. With perseverance, the soul finds salves and satisfying answers which will be revealed in the coming weeks as the prescribed process unfolds, then takes over, and appears to conclude. However, tradition holds that instead it will stay with us, settle in, and hopefully bring about change and new inner growth as our faith in its inherent power renews itself. As author Jack Riemer concluded in his contribution to our little book, "Now is the Time," pp. 23-4: "Turn us around, O God, and bring us back toward You. Revive our lives, as at the beginning, and turn us toward each other, God, for in isolation, there is no life."

Every year with this being my 35th High Holy Days at TBS — please believe this: The music and prayers do make their way to all the right places when we commune, be it in person or on YouTube. Together, we can experience a beautiful beginning to this sacred and significant season, "The Days of Awe."

Forgiveness —AND— Letting Go



THURSDAYS • AUGUST 28, SEPTEMBER 4 & 11 • 10:00 – 11:30 AM

**What can we do with all of the bad memories and experiences
that we have gone through over the course of our lives?**

One of the main goals of the Jewish High Holy Days is to forgive people who have wronged us. In this three-part series, we're going to look at the twin processes of forgiveness and letting go. We will see how they are appropriate in different circumstances and can help us to mature as human beings and stop being stuck in the past.

Forgiveness is a conscious decision to release feelings of resentment, anger and the desire for revenge towards someone who has hurt us. It's the process of acknowledging that harm and making a choice to move forward without being held captive by negativity. It is not a simple process.

Sometimes we may not be able to forgive, but we still need to move on. Other times the person who wronged us is unwilling or unable to explain themselves, or to acknowledge the harm that was done. At some point we will have to understand that we have reached the point that dwelling on what has happened in the past is simply unhealthy for us and it is time to wipe the slate clean and let the past live in the past.

By the end of this course, we will have explored the process of forgiving and letting go, enabling each participant to understand and apply the means to nurture our own emotions rather than appreciating the emotions of the other person. Bad people may be bad and they may remain bad...but we want to live whatever years are left to us with as much happiness and joy as possible.

HIGH HOLY DAY

MONDAYS • AUGUST 25, SEPTEMBER 8 & 15 • 10:00 – 11:30 AM

Rosh Hashanah begins on the evening of Monday, September 22nd and Yom Kippur begins 10 days later. In contrast to some other Jewish holidays, the High Holy Days are spent primarily praying in synagogue. The more that we understand about what these holy days teach us and how we can engage with them spiritually as well as religiously, the more meaningful that they will be.

In three sessions, we will go through some of the major themes of these holy days. We will look at a few sample prayers and discuss some of the major traditions. We will discuss what we hope to accomplish emotionally over the high holy day period as well as what we can begin to do after this course begins.

The high holy day prayers speak in metaphors, utilizing many of the traditional theological categories of rabbinic Judaism. If you are not familiar with these categories, then many of the prayers can appear to be difficult to grasp. We will go through some of them and try to make them easier to understand and make suggestions on how they can be looked at from different perspectives, depending on your personal perspective on life.

ANCIENT BIBLICAL INTERPRETATION

**WEEKLY STUDY GROUP • WEDNESDAYS • 9:00 – 10:30 AM
BEGINNING SEPTEMBER 3, 2025**

"Ancient Biblical Interpretation" is a new weekly study group which will be led by Rabbi Dana Evan Kaplan. Using James Kugel's "The Bible As it Was" as a text, the participants will discuss how the earliest interpreters of the scriptures radically transformed the Torah and made it into the document that has come down to us today. The course is designed for persons willing to make an on-going commitment to study.

Using biblical stories we know well, we will ask how and why the writers of this formative age of interpretation – roughly 200 B.C.E. to 150 C.E. – assumed such a significant role. Mining their writings – including the Dead Sea Scrolls, works of Philo and Josephus and letters of the Apostle Paul, and writing of the Apostolic Fathers and the rabbinic Sages – we will read short selections from the actual texts that uncover this crucial interpretive process.

Going over every detail in the Torah's stories, prophecies, and laws, these interpreters let their own theological and imaginative inclinations radically transform the Bible's very nature. Their sometimes surprising interpretations soon became the generally accepted meaning. These interpretations, and not the mere words of the text, became the Torah.

This will be a basic, yet simple course for those who would like to read prayer book Hebrew. It will require some practice at home and some perseverance after the course ends but it is definitely possible to learn to read the Hebrew letters from the prayer book. Even if you are not entirely successful, the familiarity with Hebrew that you will acquire will make you feel more connected to the Friday night prayer service and Judaism as a whole.

This three month course will be taught by Mariane Anderson, a TBSWV member with many years of experience teaching Hebrew to children and adults. She has taught group classes as well as tutoring 1 to 2 students. Her previous students will tell you that she is very patient.
