#### Controversies in Judaism Shofar May 2023

Monday May 1st we're going to be starting a new course called controversies in Judaism. What I would like to argue is that it's not the controversies themselves that are so important but rather the discourse around how we Jews debate those controversies. It is the discourse of disagreement in Judaism which is such a fundamental part of our religion and culture.

In the times of the Sages roughly 2,000 years ago, there were two very famous scholars named Hillel and Shammai. Both were prominent scholars but Hillel was known for being more tolerant and lenient and Shammai was known for being strict and impatient. Each had a group of students who were called respectively Beit Hillel and Beit Shammai. There were a series of disagreements between Beit Shammai and Beit Hillel that went unresolved. This was part of the process of talmudic discourse – it is the quality of the debate that is important rather than the end result.

According to the Jerusalem Talmud, Beit Shammai prevailed suddenly by using threats of violence. ignoring the need to hear other voices and debate civilly and focusing on the intellectual arguments rather than the desire to grab power. This had been their methodology for many years. But suddenly Beit Shammai prevailed by "using swords and spears". Once Beit Shammai had grabbed power, they passed 18 laws that were particularly controversial.

In the Babylonian Talmud (Shabbat 17a), it is written that on this day: "They thrust a sword into the Beit Midrash... Whoever entered, entered, and those who wished to leave could not leave. On that same day Hillel was stopped – sitting before Shammai as if he was one of his students. It was as disastrous a day for the Jewish People as the day the golden calf was made."

What the rabbis meant was that it was a tremendous catastrophe that one side resorted to force to get their way rather than their argumentation. Our intellectual tradition goes way back and we are expected to be able to marshall the force of argument using facts and analysis of those facts in order to persuade the other side.

With that in mind we're going to look at a number of controversial issues in Judaism. Of course anything that has an impact on American society can be seen as a Jewish issue as well. So for us to consider it, there have to be readily available Jewish sources that speak to the issue in theory or practice. As with the above story, our emphasis is not on resolving the issue and saying Judaism favors this side and not that side but rather the analysis and interpretation using sources from Judaism and other relevant sources.

We will decide together what will be some of the topics that we will cover so that should be interesting in and of itself. Everyone is invited to enroll and to come at 10:00 a.m.



### NOTES FROM OUR CANTOR

Lag BaOmer, this year coinciding with May 9<sup>th</sup>, is another way of saying "the thirty-third day of the Omer". The Omer not only tracks the Spring agricultural cycle but also counts the period between Passover, marking our people's exodus from Egypt, to Shavuot, which commemorates the giving of the Torah at Mount Sinai. Pesach and Shavuot are the times of harvesting barley and wheat. Torah accorded this period in between as a time for sacrifices of thanksgiving for seven weeks. "Omer" denotes the measure of grain being offered. The journey from slavery to freedom is also aspiritual one, moving from the wilderness of the soul to preparation for receiving the Torah.

Historically, the period of Omer is a time of semi-mourning; weddings and other festivities are avoided, in memory of a plague that killed thousands of students of Rabbi Akia, a Talmudic scholar. Lag BaOmer was the day on which the plague ceased, and thus mourning ceased, and it became a day of great joy. It is also the celebration day of Rabbi Shimon bar Yochai, the legendary author of the Zohar. Although Lag BaOmer is the anniversary of his death, in accordance with his wishes, it is treated joyfully. It has been called a 'Jewish Woodstock,' as hundreds of thousands gather near his burial site on Mount Meron in northern Israel. Amidst feasting and music, hundreds, or thousands of three-year old boys, Ashkenazic and Sephardic, receive their first haircuts and *peiyes*. People camp, picnic, and party; in the evening enormous bonfires are kindled on the roof of the domed building in honor of the shining light Rabbi Shimon brought into the world. For the entire 24 hours, groups of whirling Chassidim, with fervor unusual even for them, dance near the fires or in the courtyard below, singing over and over the infectious songs praising the enshrined Rabbi. Within the castle-like structure built upon his tomb, small groups of men and others of women study Zohar and recite Psalms. A strong tradition exists that anyone who prays sincerely "at Rabbi Shimon," especially on Lag BaOmer, will be answered. At this late date, it might be wise to make travel arrangements for *next* year's events.

Several traditional and popular songs are associated with the holiday; these are sung around bonfires, at weddings, and at *tishen* (gatherings) held by Hasidic Rebbes on Lag BaOmer. "*Bar Yochai*" was composed by Rabbi Shimon Labi (c. 1490-c.1584), a 16<sup>th</sup> century kabbalist, in honor of Rabbi Shimon Bar Yochai. It is sung with great fervor. The seventh of ten verses is translated here:

"Bar Yochi...When you reached the Holy of Holies of the Supernal Tabernacle, you grasped the secret of the Green Line (the thread of measured light through which God created the world) through which He continually renews the works of Creation daily. The works of Creation are known as the Seven Weeks (Forty-nine Gates of Understanding). In order to go beyond this and grasp the secret Fifty, you bound (your thought to) the letter *shin* (on both sides of the Head-Tefilin)." Refrain: "Bar Yochai –fortunate are you, anointed with joyous oil (i.e. wisdom), over and above your companions."

This is most likely deeper into kabbalistic practice than most of us will ever venture. However, it is enlivening to know how much kabbalah has meant and still means to so many. It *is* very deep. Just fathoming it all could take a lifetime or more. So, it may be enough at this point, to just make a joyful noise by singing with much appreciation for all the good that has been bestowed upon us.

#### Annual Meeting of the Congregation

One of the privileges and responsibilities each of us, who pays dues to be a member of a Reform congregation, has is to exercise the right of membership by voting at the Annual Meeting of the congregation. The Annual Meeting for Temple Beth Shalom of the West Valley (TBS) will be held at 11:00 AM on Sunday, May 21, 2023. PLEASE MARK THIS DATE ON YOUR CALENDAR AND PLAN TO ATTEND.

By now, every regular member of TBS should have received a packet of important information that will be voted upon by temple members at this meeting. IF YOU DID NOT RECEIVE THIS INFORMATION, which was mailed to your home, please contact Helene Fox in the temple office immediately. The information in the packet covers three general, but important areas: temple finances and a budget for 2023-2024 (that was approved by the Board of Directors on April 16, 2023) that must be adopted by the congregation; a slate of officers and trustees for 2023-2024; and various changes to the Constitution of the congregation. If there are two or more members in your home, there should be enough ballots for each member to vote their own wishes.

All of this information is very important with respect to the future of our congregation and I ask that you take the time to read all the information carefully.

Our Parliamentarian, Russ Robbins, spent a great amount of time explaining the various items being proposed as changes or additions to the Constitution. You will find that explanation on a sheet of paper with a heading in large print that reads "**Please, please read this page**". Any proposed change to the Constitution must first be approved by the Board of Directors, currently by a majority vote, and then forwarded to the members of the congregation for voting on at the Annual Meeting, or a special meeting called for such purpose.

Most of these additions and minor changes were initiated by the Constitution and Bylaws Committee and were approved unanimously by the Board of Directors at their meeting on April 16, 2023. They are identified on another enclosure which is identified by a VERY LARGE "**A**" in the left-hand corner. This two-sided document shows how a specific article of the Constitution will be impacted if you vote for the proposed changes (identified as numbers 1 through 12).

Four changes to the Constitution were initiated by seven (7) members of the congregation and submitted to the Board of Directors for approval. Three of these four changes were approved, but not unanimously, and are listed on another sheet of paper identified by a VERY LARGE "**B**" in the left-hand corner. They are identified as numbers 13 through 15. After a brief statement of what the proposed change is, the remaining information on this-two sided document illustrates for you how the proposed change will actually impact each Article of the current Constitution.

The remainder of the information in the packet pertains to finances/budget and the slate of officers and trustees for the next two years. This information is equally important to all the constitutional changes and I urge you to read it carefully.

There are three members of the Board of Directors who, over the past 3-4 months, have committed many hours exercising patience and ensuring that all the information presented to you was developed carefully and with great thought and consideration. I cannot thank them enough for their leadership, dedication, and commitment to act in the best interest of the congregation. They are:

Russ Robbins (Trustee) – Parliamentarian; Chair of the Constitution & Bylaws Committee Nan Rubin-Lieber (Trustee) – Chairperson of the Nominating Committee Jonathan Werbel (Treasurer) – Chairperson of the Budget and Finance Committee

If you are unable to attend the meeting on May 21, you can still vote by mail or by dropping your ballot off at the office BEFORE NOON ON THURSDAY, MAY 18. If you vote by mail or drop off ballot, you must **SIGN THE FRONT** of your ballot envelope if you want your vote to be counted. If your signature is not readable, please print your name below it.

You can also bring your ballot to the Annual Meeting on May 21. However, if you vote by mail or drop off, YOU MAY NOT VOTE AGAIN at the Annual Meeting!

I hope to see all of you on May 21, 2023, at 11:00 AM in the Social Hall at TBS.

The vote of every member of the congregation is very important.




Chair plaques are available for purchase for \$200 each. We only have 30 sanctuary chairs left that don't have sponsor plaques on the back of them.



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
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
