

December 2023 Hanukkah

The Talmudic Debate over how many Hanukkah Candles to start with and how many to end with?

The Talmud is filled with debate. The rabbis however were not enamored with the holiday of Hanukkah and so they didn't really want to talk about it too much. This was because they remembered that the descendants of The Maccabees persecuted the rabbis for reasons that go beyond the scope of this short article in the Shofar. Nevertheless, the average Jew in the rabbinic times loved Hanukkah just like we do today.

So the rabbis eventually had to acquiesce and accept the existence of Hanukkah as a holiday. Then the rabbis did what they did best. They debated the details of Hanukkah. I'll tell you about one such debate – dealing with which direction we should light the candles of Hanukkah.

Hanukkah starts early this year – on the evening of December 7th. Hanukkah is observed for eight nights and days, starting on the 25th day of Kislev according to the Hebrew calendar. So I guess it doesn't really start early since it's starting on the same 25th day of Kislev as it did last year! But for us who mostly follow the weeks and months using the Gregorian calendar, it certainly feels a little bit earlier than usual.

All of us know the basic rituals of Hanukkah. The most important one is to light the menorah called a hanukkiah, a candelabrum with nine branches using a Shamash meaning "attendant". Each night, one additional candle is lit by the shamash until all eight candles (plus the shamash) are lit on the final night of the festival, which this year is Thursday night the 14th of December (as well as the following day).

The name "Hanukkah" derives from the Hebrew verb "חנך" ch-ne-ch, meaning "to dedicate". On Hanukkah, the Maccabean Jews – later called Hasmoneans – regained control of Jerusalem and rededicated the Temple. They drove out the Greek Syrians and re-established Jewish Independence over the land of Israel.

So what was the debate over which way to light the Hanukkah lights? The word Hanukkah is also the Hebrew acronym for "Eight candles the halakha is like the House of Hillel". This is a reference to the debate between two of the most famous rabbis of the talmud: Hillel and Shammai on what number of candles should we start with and end with. Actually they used oil in those days, but whether oil or wax candles you still have to choose how many candles to light on the first night! But we know that it is one candle plus the Shamash, isn't it?

Continued Message From Rabbi Kaplan

Shammai was usually known to be the stricter one. He and his students felt that eight candles should be lit on the first night, seven on the second night, and so on down to one on the last night!!! This will be surprising to many of us who have grown up accustomed to following Hillel!

Shammai argued that the miracle was greatest on the first day when no one expected that there was any possibility of having a light in the temple and then the extra days were "just gravy," as they say. Maybe we could change that expression from "just gravy" to "just a few extra latkes"!

In contrast, Hillel was in favor of starting with one candle and lighting an additional one every night, up to eight on the eighth night. His reasoning was that since the miracle of the single cruise of oil lasting eight days became more and more miraculous each day you should therefore increase the number of lights that you light.

The sages of the talmud had to make a decision and as we know they adopted the position of Hillel. So that's what we do today and it's such an entrenched custom that it would never occur to us to start on the first night with all eight candles lit.

I want to wish everyone a very, very happy Hanukkah!



NOTES FROM OUR CANTOR

"Who can retell the things that befell us?"

That opening line of *Mi' Y'Maleil* certainly appears to be up to the minute for singing this Hanukkah, what with the falling of rockets, missiles, and drones on Israel. Hanukkah, once conspired a minor holiday, always reminds us how decidedly delicate our existence is. However, this is not a new thought. In the first four stanzas of the medieval poem *Maoz Tzur* are listed 'things that befell us:' Slavery and subsequent exodus from Egypt; Babylonian captivity; and Haman's wicked genocidal plot.' It was written too early to include the Inquisition, which caused the further Diaspora. Then came the Crusades, the Holocaust, the modern Israeli wars, and, in this century, and again this year, attacks by Hamas. So, why should we sing?

The poetry and melodies of Hanukkah affect us, even move us, to realize the fragility of our people, be they in Israel or even in the United states. We see advertisements selling products that protect one's identity from being stolen. There do not appear to be products that protect one's identity from being wiped out completely. The Hasmonean victory celebrated at Hanukkah had been 'gorilla' warfare, a civilian revolt led by the Maccabees, to resist the annihilation of Jewish identity by the Seleucid Empire. Our right to exist is always being challenged. So, is being Jewish worth all this fuss?

It is through prayer (often sung) and songs that we reconnect our passion and rekindle that inner fire of black on white: Torah, given to us by the Almighty, which enables us to create lives worth living. We are the 'people of The Book' and that may seem a heavy load to carry but it proves to be worth every step. We sing, "I have a little dreidl", which reminds us of its hidden importance: Learning Torah had been banned, so having a symbolic 'toy' inside a guarded, secret cave, enabled children to learn when Torah was hidden as guards warned of a soldier's approach. Well, it was a simple child's song, right? Now, of course, the days of book banning are gone forever.


Yes, there are many dangers out there to be reckoned with and we must have sharp eyes to see what's underneath, just as gold-covered coins at Hanukkah are not filled with gold. So, perhaps, the real threat to our identity may come from within ourselves. Do we have the conviction of the Maccabees when we kindle our chanukiahs and sing in Hebrew? (translated):

"We light these lights for the miracles and the wonders, for the redemption and battles that You waged for our forefathers, in those days at this season."

If we are *not* destined to be an historical footnote, as it appears the Seleucid Empire is, we should enliven our inner strength this holiday. For me, that resolve is rekindled by singing Hanukkah's inspirational melodies such as Peter Yarrow's "Light One Candle:"

"Don't let the light go out! it's lasted for so many years. Don't let the light go out, let it shine through our hope and our tears."

Hanukkah's True Meaning: Jewish Survival

December means the celebration of the eight-day festival of lights of Hanukkah for Jews everywhere. This Jewish holiday is perhaps the best known and most visible to many people. Although in recent years Hanukkah has become commercialized like Christmas materialism, Hanukkah brings families together to celebrate its history.

Early History

Hanukkah is one of Judaism's newest holidays even though it is over 2,200 years old. It doesn't even appear in the Bible. It began as a celebration in 164 B.C. to celebrate the victory of the Maccabees over the powerful army of King Antiochus of Syria. The celebration lasted eight days and was modeled on the festival of Sukkot, which was banned by Antiochus.

In following centuries, when Jews tried to do what the Maccabees had done, and much devastation happened. Rome controlled Israel in A.D. 68-70 and again in A.D. 133-135 and the Jews held many a revolt to rid their land of this foreign power. War no longer was a solution and a new ideology came about.

How Hanukkah Evolved

Rabbis rethought Hanukkah's origins as a celebration of a military victory. Instead, they felt Hanukkah should commemorate the miracle that occurred during the Maccabees rededication of the Temple. The story now told how one jar of oil, enough for one day, had burned for eight days in the temple's eternal lamp.

This story appears in the Talmud. From then on instead of celebrating the Maccabees war victory, Hanukkah celebrated God's miracle. This is symbolized by the lighting of an eight-branched Menorah. However, Hanukkah remained a minor Jewish holiday throughout the medieval period.

What Hanukkah Means Today

Hanukkah today reminds Jews how history reflects the value of religious freedom that Jews share with all other Americans. Bright decorations, favorite songs, family, and community celebrations keep everyone excited about Judaism. Yet, as we retell the story of war and persecution, our joy becomes sadness, for the death and destruction in Israel these past two months. Jews must face again, right NOW, a powerful enemy, who seeks to destroy them.

As we retell the Hanukkah story this year, may we pray for Israel and for all who are suffering. May God protect them and let them once again see the lights of the Menorah and the miracle of peace.



Jews, Christians, people of other faiths, and non-believers alike have heard of The Ten Commandments and probably most of us tell people that we try to follow them. But, do we really know what they say?

This 3 week course, led by Rabbi Dana Evan Kaplan, will take a look at the Ten Commandments and explore some startling discoveries about the actual nature of the text. We'll look at what the biblical verses may have meant and then discuss what they might mean for us today.

Dana Evan Kaplan is Rabbi at Temple Beth Shalom of the West Valley (Reform), where he teaches both adults and children. He completed his Rabbinic studies and was ordained at Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religious (Jerusalem campus) and received a PhD in Jewish History from Tel Aviv University. He has authored numerous articles and several books, including The New Reform Judaism: Challenges and Reflections (2013) and A Life of Meaning: Embracing Reform Judaism's Sacred Path (ed; 2018). Prior to becoming Rabbi at Temple Beth Shalom in 2019, he held pulpits in South Africa, Georgia, Jamaica and Alabama. He has held adjunct faculty positions at various colleges and has served as a weekend Scholar-in-Residence for numerous congregations.

Much has changed since our 4-week course - "Israel in Crisis" - was advertised and held. Little did anyone have an inkling of or thought that before the course was two weeks old Israel would be attacked by Hamas and soon at war. As this brochure is being printed we don't know what things will look like the first day of this course on December 7, but we know that Israel will be on the edge of something.

In this three-part series which is open to people of all faiths, Rabbi Dana Evan Kaplan will explain and analyze the security crisis that Israel is facing. We will look at the ideology of the terrorist groups that are seeking to destroy the state of Israel and try to explain why Israel was caught so unprepared for the terrorist attacks of October 7th. Most importantly, we will try to explore what is likely to happen in the coming weeks and months and what the long-term prognosis might be.

Rabbi Kaplan is uniquely qualified to lead this discussion, having lived in Israel, spending time there again in June and July of 2022 and 2023, and having regular contact with numerous friends who currently live in Israel, and speaking Hebrew so he is able to follow live streaming Israeli television broadcasts. He is the Rabbi at Temple Beth Shalom of the West Valley (Reform).


Temple Beth Shalom of the West Valley is hosting a clothing and shoe recycling bin to help keep textiles out of the landfills!

Do you know what a Chavurah is?...

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
