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A MESSAGE FROM RABBI KAPLAN

From the time I was a little boy, there was one thing in particular that I loved about the High Holy Days. I'll give you one guess as to what it was. No, it was not the apples and honey. Yes, that is correct — it was the sounding of the shofar!

Seemingly in the middle of morning services, someone would pull out this big animal's horn and start blowing on it. It was so incredibly incongruous to the synagogue setting where everyone was sitting politely following the service in our machzorim dressed in our finest clothes. I had never seen an animal's horn before. There weren't very many Rams wandering around Manhattan in those days. It seemed like a window had been opened into the Judaism of thousands of years earlier.

Where does this come from? There are two biblical citations of note, one from Leviticus and the other from Numbers. I use *Sefaria*, a free online resource for Jewish texts, as my source for both the Hebrew as well as the translations.

In The Book of Leviticus, Chapter 23:24, it is written:

דַבֶּר אֶל־בְּנֵי יִשְׂרָאֵל לֵאמֶר בַּחֹדָשׁ הַשְׁבִיעִׁי בְּאֶחֶד לַחֹדֶשׁ יִהְיֶה לָכֶם שַׁבָּתוֹן זְכְרָוֹן הְרוּעָה מִקְרָא־קְדָשׁ:

Speak to the Israelite people thus: In the seventh month, on the first day of the month, you shall observe complete rest, a sacred occasion commemorated with loud blasts.

The Hebrew word Teruah is translated as "loud blasts".

In the Book of Numbers, Chapter 29:1, it is written:

וּבַחֹדָש הַשְׁבִיעִי בְּאֶחָד לַחֹדָש מְקָרָא־קֹדָשׁ יִהְיֶה לָכֶּם כָּל־מְלֶאכֶת עֲבֹדָה לְא תַעֲשָׂוּ יָוֹם תְרוּאָה יִהְיֶה לָכֶם:

In the seventh month, on the first day of the month, you shall observe a sacred occasion-you shall not work at your occupations. You shall observe it as a day when the horn is sounded.



The Hebrew expression "Yom Teruah" could be translated as the "Day of the Sounding of the Horn". Note that both biblical citations refer to Rosh Hashanah as the first day of the seventh month. Neither make any reference to that day being the new year! Apparently the association of this day with the new year only came together later in history.

The original intent may not have been to create a unique ceremony observed only once a year. The Israelites marked the new month when the new moon appeared and the Festival of Trumpets, as I'm calling it, may have just been another such ceremony. The Book of Psalms mentions that there were horns blasted on the new moon, presumably indicating that this ceremony took place every month.

In the Book of Psalms Chapter 81, Verse 4, it is written that horns were sounded on the New Moon:

תִּקְעָוּ בַחָדֶשׁ שׁוֹפֶר בַּכָּסָה לְיָוֹם חַגֵּנוּ:

Blow the horn on the new moon,

on the full moon for our feast day.

The Hebrew word "Shofar" is translated as "horn".

There were Ram's horns sounded as well as silver horns called in Hebrew Hazozerah. The Hazozerah was made of bronze, silver or silver alloys and is mentioned 31 times in the Hebrew Bible. On Rosh Hashanah, a person sounding a Shofar was in the center with a person blowing a trumpet on either side.

Maimonides writes that the purpose of the sounding of the Shofar on Rosh Hashanah is to wake us up, to rouse us out of our stupor. People get into a routine and then they stop thinking about what really is important in life. When we hear the sounding of the Shofar on the Festival of Trumpets, we stop and think that we have indeed become too complacent. We rely on the sounding of the Shofar to give us motivation.

Motivation can be either extrinsic or intrinsic. Extrinsic motivation comes from outside of the individual, involving external rewards such as money or higher social status. Intrinsic motivation comes from within us and involves internal rewards meaning, making us feel good. One of the important goals of Rosh Hashanah is to help us build up motivation to start thinking and planning how we can be better people and live our best life in this coming year 5784.

Shanah Tovah.



NOTES FROM OUR CANTOR

What does it take to catch our attention? Okay. Moving right along, what would it take to keep our attention?

Let us say that the hook which got us was a melody --- not just *any* melody, but one that is hauntingly beautiful, so deep, that it feels like it is connecting to our *neshama* (soul). That experience is a major part of the *nusach* (musical themes) of the Days of Awe. Reminiscent of the Sirens of Greek mythology, the High Holiday music may call to us, addressing the urgency of our surrender to its poignant, sweet retreat accentuated by powerful leaps into cathartic crescendos. Formulated by centuries of wisdom, love, and commitment, the time-tested melodies underscore a plan to whet our appetite to reexamine our spiritual past and future goals. We are aurally prompted to see who we are and who we want to become in the new year.

The deceptive simplicity of *Avinu Malkeinu* (our parent, our Sovereign), a favorite folk song in which we may easily participate, heralds our hitherto unvoiced desire to repent and be forgiven for any sins and *all* sins. This, being a discussion about music, is not the place to define what a sin *is* or isn't. However, the music of Rosh Hashanah subtly implies that something is going to happen very soon. Much more foreboding is *Unetanah Tokef* (let us cede power), unleashed on Yom Kippur Day, which, translated, begins: "Let us now relate the power of this day's holiness". Its melody embodies that 'no nonsense' command in both its textural and musical strength. Through the use of the picturesque symbolism of a shepherd accounting for each of his sheep, the Day of Judgement is proclaimed: "Who shall live and who shall die?"

The bravado of the services is conceptualized very discreetly when we stand at full attention for the blast of the *shofar* (ram's horn). Its wail is reminiscent of a prayer without words, an indistinguishable yet mimicking cry of the conscious-stricken human voice. The sages suggested that the horn's curve symbolizes the bent back of the now humbled penitent. The distinct blasts during the services further that image; *tekiah* is a deep moan, *teruah* is a wavering sob, and *sevarim*, a broken groan. One *midrash* (mode of Biblical interpretation, originally oral) says that these three pleading sounds are carried by special angels to our merciful God.

The *Yizkor* (Remembrance) Service is our individual opportunity to hear our own inner voices observing remembrance of loss, whether recent or from long ago. The gut-wrenching melodies add fuel to our stored-up need to express our personal kinship with those no longer reachable but through this profound process. *Eil Malei Rachamim* (God, Full of Compassion) is the crowning prayer, chanted by the *hazzan* (cantor). The disembodied strains of this floating melody are a petition which asks for the departed souls' ascension and subsequent inheritance of God's eternal peace and love. Because the loss of dear ones cannot easily be reckoned with by words alone, the sonorous yet abandoned cry of the cantor, combined with the rich, Hebrew liturgy, conjure an unspoken but soulful dialogue between mourner and beloved. The human voice, aching, but hopeful, nonetheless, dedicates this memorial through song. As such, prayers are lifted on delicate wings of sweet melody, wafting to reach depths and heights unavailable by intellect alone.

As a joyful congregation, may we approach the Hebrew year, 5784, with heavenly music in our hearts, and God's love on our lips: *Shir Chadash,* Sing a new song!

A Preview of 2023 – 2024 Adult Education Courses

Why do we even offer adult education courses at Temple Beth Shalom? Let's take a look at our Mission Statement: The Mission of Temple Beth Shalom of the West Valley is to fulfill and nurture the spiritual, social, and educational needs of our diverse Jewish community. Adult education is just part of many educational offerings at TBS. But it is an important part!

The Adult Education Committee has been meeting since early July to start planning for a full calendar of adult education offerings for TBS members from October 2023 through May 2024. The courses being planned for this year are very diverse, which we hope will appeal to a large number of our members. While our primary audience is the members of TBS, we also see adult education to be a part of our outreach efforts to unaffiliated Jews in the West Valley. To reach this population, we advertise all our courses in West Valley newspapers, social media, and through our own email lists. As a result of our advertising, we do attract unaffiliated Jews to our courses. At least one became a member last year.

A flyer for our October courses will be available soon, but we wanted to let everyone know about these two courses right away. They are very different, but both are relevant and timely and we hope many of our members will be interested in one or both.

Israel in Crisis: What's Happening and Why

Rabbi Kaplan lived in Jerusalem during the years of his Rabbinic studies and he visited Jerusalem for two weeks in July of 2022 and July 2023. So he has personal knowledge of changes within Israel and saw first-hand in July what is happening in Israel now. He will lead discussion on this topic beginning with historical background information, including Israel's government structure. He will then focus on current issues such as judicial reform efforts, the settlers, the ultra-orthodox, and moderates on the left, as well as the threat of brain/income drain in the country. In the last session, we will focus on what is the future for the country.

Dates and Time: 10:00 - 11:00 AM; October 2, 9, 16, and 23 (Mondays)

Reform Judaism: What We are All About and What Challenges We Face

TBS is a Reform Temple affiliated with the Union for Reform Judaism. Reform Judaism is a topic about which our Rabbi has written several books and is recognized in the Reform Rabbinate for his knowledge and expertise in this area. During these four session, Rabbi Kaplan will help the participants look at what Reform Judaism in America means and will provide a brief history of the Reform movement. Some of the critical issues and challenges he will present are mitzvoth and prayer, the non-recognition in Israel of Reform, and how the Reform movement has responded to assimilation in the United States. Dates and Time: 10:00 – 11:00 AM; October 5, 12, 19, and 26 (Thursdays)


Chair plaques are available for purchase for \$200 each. We only have 30 sanctuary chairs left that don't have sponsor plaques on the back of them.

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

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
